FULL COMPLIANCE WITH REQUIREMENTS ON NON-IONISING RADIATION EMISSIONS - ODTR 2ND AUDIT REPORT

The Telecoms Regulator has concluded her second audit report to ensure that licensed operators are in compliance with their licence conditions relating to emission limits for non-ionising radiation. The report, carried out by Enterprise Ireland on behalf of the ODTR, concludes that all the companies audited have procedures in place to ensure conformity with the general exposure limits specified in the latest international guidelines and are in compliance with these guidelines.

Audits were carried out in the following companies: RTE, Radio Tara (Atlantic 252), Cablelink, CMI, Princes Holdings, Suir Nore Relays, Esat Telecom, eircom, Eircell, Esat Digifone and ESB. The audits included measurements of emission levels at 30 sites throughout the country. For each site the ODTR requires that the measured levels of nonionising radiation emissions should not exceed the ICNIRP (International Commission on Non-Ionising Radiation Protection) limits in any part of the site or surrounding area where the general public have access.

Of the 30 sites selected for radio emission measurements, 28 were different from the sites chosen during the first audit which was published in July 1998. However, the RTE sites at Tullamore and Offaly, which had exceeded the IRPA (International Radiation Protection Agency) limits during the 1998 audit, were again examined. This time all sites comply with the international guidelines. These sites were chosen as representative of the different types of radio installations countrywide, including many sites with multiple users.
